Welcome to the Annual Report for our Centenary Year 2012. We had a great year with fabulous events and increased membership of our organisation. The report is a combination of all the Senior Management Teams efforts over 2012 to cover the Centenary of Guiding and the Operational Plan for Girl Guides South Australia.

The Girl Guides Australia Strategic Plan was adopted by the State in 2010 and the Operational Plan was set to deliver some measureable outcomes for Guiding. The Strategic Plan headlined six main areas. These are High Quality Leadership; Reinvigorated Brand; Redesigned Program experience; Unified, strong, National organisation; Sustainable funding with new commercial model; and disciplined change management and project management.

All of the Senior Management of Girl Guides SA including the Board, State Management Team (and the State Managers' teams), Region Leader Team and the Staff worked to fulfil the needs for Guiding in 2012. There were a lot of successes and the biscuit campaign was definitely one of those. It was a delight to see the idea that the biscuit campaign is actually teaching our girls and young women skills in entrepreneurship, in sales and marketing, in business and in business ethics begin to take shape. Yes it is a fundraising campaign and it is our fundraising campaign. It was also great to see that our market for biscuits is expanding and to acknowledge the highest sellers.

As a State our other successes were in the high participation rate in National initiatives such as the Mobile Phone recycling, the Learning and Development surveys and the Promise and Law surveys and increasing our public profile with the Centenary of Guiding. South Australia has always been a leader in recycling efforts and passionate about the environment so it was not a surprise that the Mobile Phone recycling efforts were high here. We have also been passionate about the strength of the organisation being in the volunteer Leaders producing a quality Girl Guide Program for the girls in their care and as such it was no surprise that the surveys on Learning and Development and the Promise and Law would garner so much interest.

South Australian Leaders and Guides have also been passionate about the longevity of our organisation and loved celebrating our achievements over the last 100 years and looking forward to the future. The opportunity to gain a special badge via learning about our history was taken up by many; the fun, learnings and fellowship obtained by the Leaders Own Event was enthusiastically received by Leaders; the party for Promise for Life was embraced by supporters of Guiding; senSAtional State Camp was loved

by many a Guide and Leader and the campfire at Elder Park was great fun and quite spectacular.



Leaders were supported through networking and training, providing specific trainings for new Leaders at Leadership Development and Qualification levels and extending skills and knowledge at Region Roadshows, cross-Region Roadshows. Water activity skills trainings in canoeing were popular events in this year mostly at our purpose built facility on the Port River called

GTS Dolphin.

Welcome information for new members and Leaders was reviewed and updated to include information about GGSA and GGA websites and a copy of the newly developed resource to support volunteers, parents and new Leaders working in units called "First 10 Weeks". State Training committee also provided input into development of the Child Safe Environments Policy with GGSA Board.

The organisation continued to seek funding for further resources to support volunteers, new equipment and resources for further training.

The use of technology continued to be explored as the Australian Training Committee trialled free Go Training Online format for meetings instead of teleconferences and an online 6 week course was made available to trial with interested trainers through a NSW facilitator. Training and Program Teams continued to develop and trial

CENTENARY

Guiding in South Australia celebrated its centenary in 2012. The year was full of celebrations of all Guiding was, is and will be. It also brought to a close the three year WAGGGS Centenary program.

The Centenary Challenge encouraged girls to learn about Guiding in the past, trying challenges from each decade of the past 100 years.

The Promise for Life event was held in May at the Torrens Parade Grounds. His Excellency the Governor Kevin Scarce and Mrs Scarce attended, together with a number of South Australian politicians and supporters of Guiding. During the evening, attendees had the opportunity to inspect historical displays and were addressed by the State Commissioner on the history of Guiding, and where Guiding is going into the future.

At the Government House Open Day Guides set up displays across the lawn, exposing a wide range of visitors to Guiding's past, uniforms, programs and international opportunities.

Guiding Light banners were available for purchase with an activity pack based around the special "Guiding Light" glow that identifies Guides all round the world.

Held on the banks of the River Torrens in Elder Park, the Centenary Campfire was an opportunity for current members, supporters and alumni to come together to enjoy one of Guiding's fondest traditions. Approximately 600 participants came together to watch the sun sinking on the Torrens behind a giant campfire and look forward to the next 100 years of Guiding.

Social functions are held each year at which members learn more about what is happening in Guiding with current activities, and have opportunity to network with other interested parties.



In 2012 the Blue and Gold held a Centenary Lunch at the Feathers Hotel in August, to which our Patron Mrs Scarce was able to attend. The guest speaker was Laura Kroetsch who is the Director of Writers' Week at the Adelaide Festival.



WAGGGS CENTENARY CHALLENGE DAY ACTIVITIES - 14 APRIL

230 participants including Leaders from 22 different units celebrated the WAGGGS Centenary Theme of "Share". This included 11 units who camped at Douglas Scrub over the weekend.

Activities were organised in 4 different pods with the themes of Service, Centenary, Outdoors and International.

Service activities included Service to Douglas Scrub as well as icing cupcakes for afternoon tea.

Centenary Pod activities included a 100 Item Scavenger Hunt as well as participating in a "I like Guides because" poster.

International Pod activities included making Blinis (Russian pancakes) on buddy burners, friendship bracelets for Sangam and Russian babushka dolls as well as a variety of international games. Outdoor pod activities included kite making and participating in the adventure course as a pair tied together. Mayor Lorraine Rosenberg from the City of Onkaparinga spoke at the Closing.

ONE PLANET DAY (BASED ON BIODIVERSITY BADGE)

On Sunday 15 April, approximately 150 Guides and their Leaders converged on Douglas Scrub to take part in One Planet Day. Through interactive games and activities focused on "Our Air", "Our Water", "Our Land" and "Our World", the girls learnt a lot about our natural environment, and earned the WAGGGS Biodiversity Badge. Popular activities included learning about water filtration in the developed World versus the developing World, butterfly spotting, cooking potatoes in three different ways, and making weird and wonderful creatures out of natural materials. Girls aged 13+ years took part in additional challenges including bird watching and learning about genetically modified foods.

On Saturday 20th October, 40 Guides and Leaders from South Met Region gathered at the Adelaide Hills Amateur Radio Society's Blackwood Clubrooms at the rear of the Blackwood Guide Hall, to have some fun communicating with Guides and Scouts around the world. With the help of members of AHARS, Guides and Cubs chatted to Scouts around Adelaide (Glenelg, Ridgehaven, St Kilda, Tranmere and Gawler), South Australia (Loxton, Ceduna and Moonta) and interstate (NSW and Old). Internet chats via Scoutlink also provided lots of contacts with Guides and Scouts in WA, Victoria, NSW, New Zealand and Norway.

The contact in Norway was excellent: participants chatted with Elin, a 21 year old Rover Scout who lived on an island off the coastal town of Rorvik. She had just woken up—it was slightly after 8.00am in Norway (4.30pm in SA).

Happy Valley Guides used Skype to communicate with a Seattle Girl Scout Unit for their JOTI experience. 13 Guides and 5 Leaders happily chatted away making new friends and learning about Girl Scouting.

Sunday 26th February was warm and very humid, but that didn't deter more than 200 Guides and Leaders from celebrating World Thinking Day by joining in games and activities designed to explore the theme "we can save our planet".

Guides were urged to "Reduce", "save" and "switch". Two of the most popular activities were making Newspaper bags (as an alternative to plastic bags) and learning about Butterflies and Butterfly gardens. Guides also played games in "Fuel free fun" and learnt about bike maintenance. They pledged to help save our environment and made "switch me off" signs for their homes. 13-17 year olds also participated in a *Trees for Life* workshop led by Martina Thompson. Guides re-potted seedlings into individual pots and learned about how they could participate in *Trees for Life*.

During the day, Guides and Leaders signed 4 petitions which were sent to State and Federal Ministers for the Environment, requesting that they "protect our climate system so that we and future generations benefit from a healthy environment to live and grow in" Many other Region, District and Unit events were held around South Australia and in total, \$900.15 was donated to the World Thinking Day Fund.

INTERNATIONAL GUIDING EVENTS

In January, a contingent of South Australians (5 leaders and 6 guides) attended Tui 12, the Girl Guiding New Zealand Jamboree held in Rotarua. All made new friends and encouraged the New Zealanders to reciprocate by attending FanTAStic the Australian Guide Jamboree, in January 2013!

In July, Kate Belcher (Lockleys) and Emma Verrall (Knightsbridge) attended the WAGGGS Girls' World Forum held in Chicago, USA. The Girls' World Forum (GWF) was the third and final in the series of Young Women's World Forums, WAGGGS' international centenary events running from 2010-2011. It was co-hosted by Girl Scouts USA. This conference was attended by over 600 guides from 38 US states and 89 countries. Girls 14-18 years old met to discuss and develop action steps to address the UN Millennium Development Goals. The event was a unique opportunity for participants to meet and interact with their global peers and look at the role they can play as global citizens.

Also in July, Claire Brown (Mawson Lakes) attended Camp 101 in Ireland. Claire continued her travels around Europe after camp including a visit to Pax Lodge in London.

In October, Emma Sheard (Magill) and Jaimi Hayhoe (Knightsbridge) attended the first GOLD event in the Cook Islands. GOLD stands for Guiding Overseas Linked with Development and projects aim to facilitate the development of Guiding in the host country through various means such as workshops and/or training sessions. The Cook Islands project is a joint project between Girl Guides Australia and Girl Guiding New Zealand over 5 years. Teams consist of four Australian members and four members from New Zealand.

Also in October, Rosey Donnelly-Grubb attended Girl Guiding New Zealand's All Trainers Conference 2012 in Wellington. Rosey is keen to share what she has learned with South Australian trainers.

At the end of the year, Wendy Kirk (State Manager) led a contingent of Guides and Leaders to Sangam World Centre in India. They attended *Gifts for change* and had a fabulous time learning about and experiencing Indian culture. They also worked with one of Sangam's Community Partners in a Community Leadership Development Project. As they were leaving, Rosey Donnelly-Grubb and a contingent of Guides and Leaders from Plympton-Kurralta Park arrived at Sangam to attend another World Centre program.

ACTIVE 8 FUTURE LEADERS PROGRAM

The Future Leaders Program has been running for twelve years in South Australia and is funded by the Minister for Youth through the Office for Youth. The Office of Youth funds 28 programs and Guides and Scouts manage 10 of these. The program is for Secondary Schools to apply for funding to run a Youth Development Program for students aged from thirteen to eighteen years of age. This is a great way to give these students 'a taste of Guiding and Scouting.'

Girl Guides and Scouts SA run this program in partnership with the assistance of a Development Officer. The Management Team consists of both Scout and Guide Personnel who meet once a term to manage the program. Every year there is a State Camp run by the management team for all schools. Annually there are about 300 students and staff who participate in a range of activities which includes the students cooking their evening meal on an open fire. Schools from the metropolitan and rural areas participate – including students with disabilities, students in remand and students who are at risk.

The Future Leader Program offers students, Leadership Development, Outdoor, Community Awareness, First Aid Certificates and Life Skills. The program runs at no cost to the students and is totally supported by the Office for

GIRLS ON TRACK FOR LIFE

The Girls on Track for Life program has been developed as a joint venture between Girl Guides and The Smith Family. This twelve week program has been adapted from the highly successful program run by Girl Guiding New Zealand in their after school clubs. The program aims to develop basic life skills, including healthy eating, responsible decision making, personal safely and socialization skills, as well as developing team work, self confidence and self respect for girls aged between 7 and 12 years of age from vulnerable families.

Since the inception of the program in 2008, Girl Guides South Australia have partnered with the Metropolitan Fire Service, Soroptimist International, Voice Interests and Education of Women Clubs of South Australia (VIEW), Communities for Children, Safer Communities and SAPOL, to enable Guides to deliver these programs.

These programs are run for girls from vulnerable families, and are financed by grants and local community support. In 2012 grants were provided by from Communities for Children, the Department of Premier and Cabinet, and the Bendigo Bank. Large donations were also received from UNESCO, Hills Holdings Limited, The Quilters Guild of SA, West Torrens Rotary Club and Seymour College.

The Community support for these programs is amazing with groups like the Melrose Park Sewing groups, VIEW (Voice Interest Education of Women) Soroptimist International, Trefoil Members and many others collecting the toiletries that are provided to the participants. The Burnside Trefoil group also supports the program by bagging the toiletries and other packages once a term.

2012 saw an increase in programs due to the support from the community and nine programs were run each termone in Whyalla, two in the Port Adelaide Enfield Council Area, two in the Onkaparinga Council Area and four in the City of Playford. A total of 135 girls participate in the programs each term.

During 2012 the Girls on Track for Life program has had great success in recruiting participants to join Guides—ten girls have joined Guides in Whyalla, two at Elizabeth and fifteen girls in the Salisbury area, an increase of enough new members to create a new Unit for the girls. The support from the wider community allows these programs to run, and the benefits to the girls and their families have been outstanding. This year the Girls on Track program was recognised with a Children's Week Award for the program.

CHILDREN'S WEEK

Children's Week 2012 is an annual festival celebrated from Friday 19th to Sunday 28th October. The Children's Week Association of South Australia is affiliated with the Children's Week Council of Australia. The National Patron is Her Excellency Ms Quentin Bryce, the Governor-General of the Commonwealth of Australia and State Patron is Mrs Liz Scarce, wife of the Governor of South Australia. State Ambassador is Mem Fox and the Media Ambassador is Jane Reilly, presenter at Channel 10.

A diverse range of healthy lifestyle activities were held throughout the State that focused attention of the wider community on children, in particular issues of health, recreation, sport, child care, education, cultural, social and emotional needs and the recognition of children's achievements.

Children's Week has been celebrated in South Australia for the past 33 years and has been supported by the Government of South Australia (Department of Education and Child Development) and the Federal Department of Education, Employment and Workplace Relations. Throughout this nearly two weeks of frenetic activity, thousands of children will have the chance to celebrate their own achievements, display their talents and just have good fun. Family activities will reflect on the lives of children in other parts of the world where safety and freedom are not automatic.

Girl Guides South Australia is an active member of the Children's Week Committee. This committee meets monthly and consists of 20 organisations that have involvement with Youth.

GGSA were successful in gaining a small grant from Children's Week to assist with the Centenary Campfire which was held late October, to conclude the Children's Week celebrations for 2012.

Glen Christie was also a guest speaker at the SA Leaders Event, providing information about the Duke of Edinburgh Award to all the Leaders who attended.

The promotion of subsidised Duke of Edinburgh registrations took place via Friday Frenzy, Region Leaders and Girl Guides South Australia social media.

LEARNING AND DEVELOPMENT PROJECT

Girl Guides Australia Learning & Development Project and Review continued vigorously throughout the year of 2012 with widespread consultation, interviews and surveys. The Survey of Trainers achieved a response rate of 89%, with results being both valid and reliable at a National and State level.

The qualitative interviews with Leaders were a rich source of information to inform the Leader questionnaire and a Leader Survey was made available on the GGA website asking all Leaders for their views on the Australian Adult Leadership Program.

The Learning and Development team implemented the results of the National Learning and Development research. The research covered the structure of the existing qualification paths, the content of trainings, Leaders' views on training, what's it is like to be a new Leader, the learning needs of experienced Leaders, the challenges faced by Guiding Partners, the appraisal system, the way the Recognition of Prior Learning System works and the approach to developing learning for Leaders of Adults and Trainers.

4 trainers attended the National Training for Trainers held at Glengarry in Sydney during June for TREAT 12 which included sessions and learning related to Training for the 21st Century, Review, Evaluate, Analyse and Technology which was very beneficial. Involvement in the Australian Training Committee ensured current initiatives and information was regularly distributed via minutes, circulars and discussion.

The task and excitement of the development and publication of Girl and Leaders Handbooks had much interaction with National Program and Training Teams as draft copies continued to be distributed for review and another review and the hard work and long wait is over as 2013 and Handbooks are released and available for purchase and use.

TREFOIL STATE GATHERING

Trefoil members enjoyed the State Gathering, held at Pineview Village Hall, Glenside in May. Special guests



included Michelle Stone, State Commissioner and Barbara Dean, Australian Trefoil Guild Adviser. Following the AGM, interesting guest speakers were Audrey Fuhrer, Olave Baden Powell Society and Graham Jaeshke, General Manager of The Smith Family.

Trefoil members enjoyed the Saturday afternoon activities, including making a wax painting card (encaustic art), discovery walks (including the Adelaide Studios of SA Film Corporation), a Guiding History 100 years celebration quiz and campfire singing.

DOUGLAS SCRUB CAMPSITE DEVELOPMENT


A plan was considered during 2011 to increase the accommodation and activities available at our Douglas Scrub Campsite to increase the financial sustainability of the campsite and in the future reduce the reliance the organisation has on membership fees. The concept plan involved a new accommodation centre, extensions to Paxlease House, modifications to Douglas House as a training centre, and a new commercial kitchen and dining facility within the Forest Reserve Hub. The plan also included an international village and new ablutions block on Ken Maquire Reserve and a new entrance to the campsite. At the end of 2011 the concept plan was delivered to Onkaparinga Council for consideration. During our 2012 year we spent time with the Council and some neighbours as we finalised the conditions for building approval to be given. Now in 2013 we have that approval to begin this project and increase our financial sustainability.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2012 show that the association incurred an operating loss from ordinary operations of \$69,286.

Operating income decreased by 11% on the previous year, with the key income items including:

- administration, program and training 171%
- dividends and interest 143%
- membership income 12%
- cork income ↓100%
- biscuit profit 18%
- retail profit ↓16%
- Douglas Scrub income 119%
- Dolphin income \$\pm\$44%
- Tuckerway income 126%




Operating expenditure increased by 5% on the previous year, with the key expenditure items including:

- Administration, Program & Training 122%
- Salaries & Staff expenditure 117%
- Douglas Scrub expenses †17%
- Dolphin expenses \$\fo125\%
- Tuckerway expenses 18%
